RED, WHITE, & BLUE AND KOKOPELLI, TOO

Are there crafted gourds that could be borrowed for a July exhibit at the Sugar Creek Art Center in Thorntown, Indiana? Our local patches have been asked to add gourds to the special RWB exhibit for the month, and it would be wonderful to add others' gourds as well. How timely—since the 26th annual IGS show is using the theme "Red, White & Blue Gourds." The theme did rather uproot our patches' plans to have a RWB gallery this year, so we shall be rethinking over the next couple of months. However, since the gourd show will conclude on May 5, I am hoping a few RWB gourds might be available for loan.

One of the joys of my day job is going through donations of books to the library and assigning them new homes. There is one new arrival that will stay with me and be available to participants to review at the IGS February 24 show committee meeting and at the state show. It is a 1990 booklet of 29 pages "Kokopelli: Casanova of the Cliff Dwellers" by John V. Young. I have seen various renderings of Kokopelli on gourds ever since I started visiting gourd shows, but I had no idea of his history nor variations.

Speculation is that Kokopelli, the traveling salesman, may have used the flute as a notice to villagers that he was coming in peace and was not an enemy sneaking up on them.

PATCH NEWS

Central Indiana Patch (Diane Werblo, contact)

In January Mercedes Arriga, RoJene Gillentine, Danny Hall, Mac McCrary, Sandra and Tim Townsend, and I all complimented Jean Long on her 3-tiered gourd snowman sitting at the entrance to GPAC where we meet. The staff members say the kids just love it; some even hug it! Sandra and RoJene provided dinner. Sandra then asked which patch members would do demos and volunteer for different jobs for the State Show. We continued working on the long-term quilt square project. Wet pieces are easily cut with heavy-duty box cutters. Put on a rack with air blowing on them, the pieces dried stiff as before. Each gourders' square might reflect the artist. For example, Mac could weave and I'm planning dotted purple paisley pattern. Even though our meeting is after Valentine's Day, some of us will be showing off red heart gourds. This spring we are looking for someone to teach us how to make rain sticks -- to go with our thunder drums. We have posted some gourd pictures on the IGS Facebook page. The Marion County Fair has requested that we have someone demo gourd art/craft at the fair in mid-June. CIP meets on the fourth Tuesday each month from 6:30-8:30 p.m. ET at the Garfield Park Arts Center in Indy.

Sugar Creek and Thorn Tree Gourd Patches (Karen Niemeyer, contact)

February/March is a great time to focus on gourd craft. Anyone who wants to work with these amazing dried garden products is welcome to the gourd patch sessions at the Thorntown Public Library, 124 N. Market St., Thorntown. Crafting sessions are held from 2-4:00 p.m. ET on the second and fourth Wednesdays and from 6-8 p.m. ET on the first and third Wednesdays each month. In addition to working on special projects, participants are invited to work on their own gourd pieces while sharing gourd conversations. February projects include finishing snowmen, cutting bird feeders, using various techniques on 4" gourd quilt squares, finishing carved gourd lamps, and making plans for March-July. In addition, there will be discussion regarding how we can volunteer to help at the state gourd show on May 4-5. Some will be teaching classes and some will help with demonstrations and make-it/take-it opportunities, while all are assisting the show chair. In July, at the town's Sugar Creek Art Center, there will be a display of red-white-blue gourds in addition to other art works, but in April the plan is to make bird houses from apple gourds. It is all gourd fun!

Birdhouse Measurements 101

Some birds will not nest in birdhouses.

Only cavity nesters will use nest boxes/houses because they nest in natural cavities.



Was he a water sprinkler, wandering minstrel, fertility enhancer, or simply a hunchbacked flute player? As the water sprinkler, he was considered a minor god who brought rain and food to the People. There are depictions of Kokopelli, followed by his wife Kokopelli-mana in a Hohokam bowl from Arizona. He has been painted and scratched on the rocks and in caves of the pre-Columbian people of the southwest United States. Young's booklet depicts him on rocks, tee shirts, pottery, and fabrics; he notes Kokopelli has never been a sinister character, never voodooistic, but frequently comic. His likeness varies almost as much as his legends, the author states, but usually he is grotesquely hunchbacked, usually phallic in the extreme, and nearly always playing some sort of flute or flageolet. His figure has been found in ruins from 200 A.D. to as late as the 16th century.

To tempt you to read Young's booklet, where he notes that Kokopelli's outstanding feature was NOT his feet, although many carvings depict six-toed symbols, I offer his explanation. "The reason Kokopelli has a name is fairly simple. The Hopi people of central Arizona, aptly called 'archaeology on the hoof,' make a variety of kachina dolls to sell to tourists. Among the dolls is one they call Kokopelli, and his 'wife' is called Kokopelli-mana. Koko is hunchbacked and plays a flute. Formerly he was vividly phallic, but the missionaries persuaded the Indians to omit this feature in the interests of what they (the missionaries) called decency. The Hopis did not consider sex to be indecent—merely absurd." Sometimes standing/marching, sometimes recumbent, sometimes with horns, sometimes potbellied, sometimes carrying a pack of seeds on his back, he is at least once depicted wearing a helmet and blowing a horn instead of a flute.

Borrow the booklet and read on—and then depict Kokopelli or him and Kokopelli-mana on a gourd. What endless challenges he offers gourd artists!
